5. PRESENTATION BY ADRIAN GORMAN - WOOL & TRANSPORT MUSEUM

Adrian presented to the committee copies of correspondence, news articles and preamble for discussion regarding the possibility of the development of a Wool and Transport Museum to be located inside the courtyard of the old gaol complex.

Copies of these documents are attached to these minutes.

A lengthy, healthy discussion was held between all committee members and Adrian. Other locations were suggested by the committee, such as Yanga Woolshed, two rooms at the Malcolm Museum or a building/facility by the river in a possible redevelopment opportunity to recognise the history of the river trade were discussed.

**Motion 1:** Whilst the Committee fully support the collection and preservation of all history including wool and transport; we do not believe the gaol is the appropriate location and therefore decline the proposal in this form.

**Motion 2:** The Committee work with Adrian and visit the Malcolm Museum to measure up the inside of the two back rooms for a possible temporary location for the wool and transport museum pieces.

**Motion 3:** The Committee work with Council to seek funding opportunities to develop Strategic Master Plans in an effort to gain grant funding for a Museum Curator to assist with the cataloguing and sorting through the contents in the Malcolm Museum.

Motion 4: Given Adrian has advised that the Gorman Family are prepared to financially invest into the project, the Committee and Council seek out funding opportunities to erect infrastructure in a location to be decided at a later date for the display of our historic past, including permanent structure for the proposed Wool and Transport Museum.

The Committee thanked Adrian for his time and he left the meeting at 5.15pm


#### 6. MANAGER COMMUNITY & TOURISM SERVICES MONTHLY REPORT

### a) Discovery Centre Visitation

Our **peak** tourist season commences in April/May then a drop off from June July and August, picking up again for September and October. Note, January and February are the quietest times for visitation in remote, rural areas.



### g) AVIC

I attended the Accredited Information Centre Industry Advisory Group meeting in Sydney on 5<sup>th</sup> March and we spoke at lengths about the impact to tourism due to bush fires, floods and now the coronavirus. We really won't know the full impact of the latter until we know ..... but all agree that it will be huge to Tourism Australia and the cities and large regional areas.

#### 7. New Business

a) Relocation of frogs inside the gaol exercise area.

Discussions were held around the frogs inside the gaol exercise area and the lack of exposure they get unless people gain access to the gaol.

**Motion**: Remove the frogs from the inside of the old gaol and contact Balranald Art Gallery to paint the three frogs and repurpose them to locations around Balranald in costume colours relevant to their location.

Those locations would be as follows:

- i) Paint in prison stripes of the early 1900's and locate outside of the gaol complex.
- ii) Paint in Lifesaver colours (red and yellow) and locate outside of the swimming pool.
- iii) Paint in Balranald Central School colours, representing a teenage student, with a skateboard and locate between Wintong School and Skate Park.
