Balranald Shire 2025 Australia Day Ambassador Dr Benjamin Veness



Child and Adolescent Psychiatrist and Churchill Fellow

Benjamin Veness is a medical doctor with sub-specialty training in child and adolescent psychiatry. He had an unusual path into medicine, having initially received a scholarship to study accounting at university.

After completing his accounting degree while on exchange in Canada, Benjamin graduated with a job in banking. As he spent his early 20s working on spreadsheets and PowerPoint slides high up in a city skyscraper, he developed a sense that he could – and should – make a greater contribution to society.

Returning to university to study medicine at the age of 25, Benjamin put his skills from the corporate world to good use. In his first year he produced his faculty's hugely successful revue, Cadavatar, raising \$43,000 for charity. He then served two terms on the University of Sydney's governing body as the undergraduate student Fellow of Senate, before spending 2013 as President of the Australian Medical Students' Association (AMSA). In this national role Benjamin represented 17,000 medical students in dealings with the media, government ministers and senior bureaucrats.

While President of AMSA, Benjamin also completed a Master of Public Health. In recognition of his academic excellence and enrichment of the diverse life of the University and the broader community, he was awarded the Edmund Barton Medal for master's by coursework achievement. In 2015 and 2016, the University profiled Benjamin in its 'Leadership for Good' campaign, alongside illustrious alumni such as Gough Whitlam, Michael Kirby and Victor Chang.

Benjamin was awarded a Churchill Fellowship in 2013 to research student mental health, travelling to the US, Canada, the UK, China and Singapore. Benjamin has been invited to present his report, titled 'The Wicked Problem of University Student Mental Health', at conferences throughout Australia. After finishing his psychiatry training, he spent most of 2022 in New York City, where he worked as a consulting expert for The Jed Foundation, a student mental health charity. Since 2023, Benjamin has been based in Sydney, where he works in the public mental health sector, treating children, families and young adults.

While working as a doctor, Benjamin has maintained his involvement in public health initiatives, medical research and advocacy. He is particularly interested in how to support Australia's next generation of young people and their families to have positive relationships and the best possible mental and physical health.

INFRASTRUCTURE REPORT

MARMA BOX CREEK ROAD

Gravel construction works of a further 3.9km section of Marma Box Creek Road commenced early January 2025. It is planned that this 3.9km section will be sealed this coming autumn. On completion of this section, Marma Box Creek Road will be sealed all the way to the intersection with Magenta Wampo Road.


MR67 - BALRANALD IVANHOE ROAD

Heavy patching works will continue in early January 2025. Heavy patching is used when large sections of the road are badly damaged or deformed.

What is heavy patching?

A road is made up of three layers:

- the SURFACE and two layers of foundation:
- the PAVEMENT
- the FORMATION or SUBGRADE



During heavy patching, the damaged SURFACE is removed. The PAVEMENT gravel is pulverised by road reclaimer machinery. A binder is mixed into the pavement gravel for strength. The pavement is then watered and re-compacted before a surface seal of either asphalt or sprayed seal is applied.

The binder being used on MR67 is called "Triple Blend", which is a mixture of lime, cement and flyash. This binder strengthens the pavement, helping it to hold together, resist moisture and cope better with the demands of today's larger, heavier traffic.

MAINTENANCE CREWS

Council's maintenance crews have also been busy on MR67 with pothole patching. They are doing an excellent job during the hot conditions.

They have also been busy installing and replacing guideposts on Council's unsealed road network making the area safer for visitors and locals. In addition, old, outdated road signs are being replaced new updated signage. This will continue across the Shire until all signage has been updated with more compliant signs.




